New Rose named for the Chelsea Pensioners, will raise funds for the Royal Hospital Chelsea.

A new rose has been bred by Harkness Roses 1879, celebrating the magnificent heritage of the Royal Hospital Chelsea.

About the Chelsea Pensioner Rose

Like the iconic scarlet coat worn with pride by the Chelsea Pensioners, our hybrid tea bush rose, splendours a similar shade. During the selection of the Chelsea Pensioner rose, Patrick Cody, one of the Chelsea Pensioners and a long time rose enthusiast, has been involved in helping to select the variety.

"The rose had to be scarlet. It had to be tough and hardy – like a Chelsea Pensioner – and it had to be garden-worthy," says The Royal Hospital's Head of Grounds and Gardens, Ric Glenn. After a rigorous process of testing and consultation with the Chelsea Pensioners, the experts at Harkness found the plant that they say still makes "our hearts flutter in excitement and joy."

The rose has abundant glossy leaves, the shine is almost as dazzling as the pensioners' shoes. It exhibits resilience against disease and is a pleasure to grow in the garden. Another attribute of this variety is its longevity as a cut flower.

The 50 petals in the flower open from a plump, rounded bud into a bloom of a traditional high centred hybrid tea shape. When fully open a bloom may be up to 10cms wide with each individual bloom creating its own impact. An abundance of these scarlet blooms makes a spectacular display. Its light fragrance evokes spicy notes of cinnamon and cloves. Rich, radiant and simply delightful.

This plant, which will grow to 1.1 metres tall by 80cms wide is happy when grown in beds and borders, while equally being at home in a large planter for those with less space on their hands. It will bloom from mid-June until late autumn.

Spark of Life is a simple rose, proving the adage that less is more. A dusky pink rose, gentle in colour with an abundance of delicate petals exposing delicious pollen and nectar to our valuable bees.

There is a lovely bloom to Spark of Life possessing a true rose perfume. It is pure sweet traditional rose; strong, lingering and lovely.

The plant is strong, producing big dark green leaves, plenty of them with really good disease resistance. Growing no more than 80 cm or 90 cm tall, it is bushy, so it fills space well. Spark of Life is an ideal rose to enjoy in big planters or pots, beds, borders and as a cut bloom in the home, where you can savour the perfume all day.

The plant will flower from around mid-June on and off until November; producing clusters of blooms that extend the flowering life of each and every stem.

It is a great privilege for us at Harkness Roses to be able to name Spark of Life with the Royal Humane Society, celebrating their 250th anniversary. A charity recognizing and awarding medals for bravery to many people who go above and beyond the normal levels of caring to help others in a time of need and danger, often saving a life while risking their own.
