By leaving a gift in your Will to the RHS you can help enrich lives through the power of plants and make significant and exciting changes to the world around us, and to those that come after us.



To improve the health of people, plants and the planet the RHS is continuing to strive for advances in horticultural science. Your gift could help support our scientific research into the pests and diseases that threaten our precious plants, find better ways to manage emerging threats to the UK's biosecurity, or help mitigate the effects of climate change.

In collaboration with UK university and industry partners, our scientists support PhD students and horticultural post-doctoral fellowships. One study is looking at optimising garden tree selection to help benefit the environment.

Case study

RHS research project in Salford, Manchester

In her four-year study, Laurianne Suyin Chalmin-Pui, our first RHS Wellbeing Fellow, has now proven that having just a few plants outside a front door can significantly reduce stress levels. Laurianne distributed two planted containers and Amelanchier trees to 38 households and found a significant increase in patterns of healthy cortisol (a hormone that regulates stress) with a relatively small number of plants.

Before the experiment, 24% of residents had healthy cortisol patterns. Just three months after the plants were introduced, this increased to 54% of residents.

Those with plants in their front gardens reported feeling happier and those suffering from loneliness also found the plants uplifting.

Leaving a gift to the RHS – frequently asked questions

Why does the RHS need legacy donations?

Gifts in Wills are vital to the RHS. As a charity that receives no direct government funding, we can only continue our work through support from visitors, members and donors.

Can I choose how the RHS uses my gift?

Yes you can. We welcome gifts that can be spent wherever the need is greatest but we are also happy to accept gifts for a particular RHS Garden or area of our work that has special meaning to you. Suggested wording for this can be found in the following pages.

Can I be sure that the RHS will spend my gift in the way that I choose?

We always endeavour to honour the wishes set out in a Will. However, in some circumstances where there are very specific terms attached to a gift, the RHS may not be able to spend it or accept it if the terms do not fall under our remit of work. If you do have a very specific request please do get in touch so that we can discuss your intentions and so that you can be sure we will be able to carry out your wishes.

What is the difference between a residuary gift and a pecuniary gift?

A residuary gift is a proportion of your estate once gifts of money or items have been distributed and costs have been deducted, while a pecuniary gift is a sum of money.

Did you know?

Including charitable gifts in your Will can have tax advantages. Your solicitor or financial adviser can help you with this, or you can find more information on inheritance tax exemptions by visiting the UK government website: www.gov.uk/inheritance-tax.

How can I be sure my gift maintains its value over time?

You can leave a residuary gift which will hold its value better than a (pecuniary) cash sum, or you can leave a fixed cash sum which can be linked to the index of retail prices, allowing your gift to keep its value in line with inflation.

How do I make a Will?

A valid Will is the only way to ensure your wishes are carried out. Making a Will isn't as complicated as you might think and shouldn't be costly. It is recommended, however, that you seek legal advice when you prepare your Will.

How do I find a solicitor to write my Will?

The RHS isn't able to recommend particular solicitors but you can search for regulated solicitors in your area via the Law Society website: solicitors.lawsociety.org.uk

Can the RHS be one of my executors?

The RHS is unable to act as an executor. It is recommended that you choose two executors, who can be a professional advisor, family member or friend.

Can I choose how much money to leave as a gift to the RHS and does it have to be for a lot of money?

We are so grateful for all gifts in Wills and value any amount given to ensure the benefits of horticulture are passed on for generations to come. Whatever amount you can leave us, rest assured we will use it wisely.

Including a gift to the RHS in your Will

By making a Will and keeping it up-to-date you can ensure that you look after the people and causes that are important to you.

Every gift to the RHS, no matter how large or small, will make a lasting difference and help to make the UK a greener, healthier and happier place.

We recommend you seek legal advice when making or updating your Will.

You can arrange your gift in different ways

A residuary gift is made from whatever is left over once gifts of money or items have been distributed and costs have been deducted.

The value of this type of gift will increase as the value of your estate increases.

You can leave the residue to one person or organisation, or you can divide it among a number of beneficiaries.

A pecuniary gift is a specified sum of money. To ensure that it keeps value over the years, you can ask your solicitor to make it index-linked.

A specific gift or item is an object or asset, like a painting, house or shares. The RHS, like many charities, have guidelines on what we are able to accept.

Suggested wording for the different ways you can leave a gift in your Will to the RHS

A straightforward gift for general purposes

Most of the gifts we receive are for general purposes, allowing us to use the funds where they are needed most.

Wording for a residuary gift

I give to the Royal Horticultural Society (registered charity number 222879/SC038262) of 80 Vincent Square, London SW1P [specify % or 'all'] of the residue of my estate absolutely for general purposes and direct that the receipt of an authorised officer of the said charity shall be good and sufficient discharge to my executors.

Wording for a pecuniary gift

I give to the Royal Horticultural Society (registered charity number 222879/SC038262) of 80 Vincent Square, London SW1P absolutely the sum of [£...] for general purposes and direct that the receipt of an authorised officer of the said charity shall be good and sufficient discharge to my executors.

Wording for an index-linked pecuniary gift

I give to the Royal Horticultural Society (registered charity number 222879/SC038262) of 80 Vincent Square, London SW1P absolutely for general purposes the sum of [£...] or such larger sum as my executors calculate to have the same value at my death as the figure specified at the date of this [insert 'Will' or 'Codicil date'] and direct that the receipt of an authorised officer of the said charity shall be good and sufficient discharge to my executors.

A gift towards a specific RHS Garden or an aspect of our work

Giving to an area of our work that means a lot to you, or a RHS Garden that holds special memories, is also a wonderful way of supporting the RHS.

In order to ensure we can honour your wishes you can specify RHS activities you would like to support – such as education, training, science, libraries, community outreach or horticultural projects.

Wording for a residuary gift

I give to the Royal Horticultural Society (registered charity number 222879/SCo38262) of 80 Vincent Square, London SW1P [specify % OR 'all'] of the residue of my estate absolutely for [use at RHS Garden... OR the benefit of.. insert RHS activity eg. Wording for a pecuniary gift

Wording for an index-linked pecuniary gift

I give to the Royal Horticultural Society (registered charity number 222879/SCo38262) of 80 Vincent Square, London SW1P absolutely the sum of [£...] or such larger sum as my executors calculate to have the same value at my death as the figure specified at the date of this [insert 'Will' or 'Codicil date'] [£...] for [use at RHS Garden...
