THE BALCONY GARDEN STORY

Step into a buzzing world where African craft meets British ingenuity and design. Making Life Better with Bees is a vibrant, sustainable urban retreat that proves small spaces can make a big impact. Inspired by our work with beekeepers across Africa, the garden showcases the vital links between bees, biodiversity, and livelihoods.

A windfallen oak trunk displays a traditional African log hive-bringing authenticity and connection to rural communities in Africa.

Upcycled planters made from old honey barrels and beehives remind us that reuse can be beautiful and practical.

A hexagonal bench invites reflection, while providing privacy and space in tight urban settings.

A vertical living wall, punctuated with solitary bee hotels, highlights the importance of wild pollinators.

All planting uses peat-free compost and drought-tolerant species.

Plants such as Agapanthus, Kniphofia, and Gleditsia 'Ruby Lace' bloom in harmony-chosen for their pollen, nectar, and seasonal beauty. The planting palette reflects both African and British styles, creating an international celebration of pollinators.

Bees for Development has worked for over 30 years in communities where bees change lives. Our RHS Chelsea garden sends a clear message:

No matter where you live, you can make life better with bees.
