Show Gardens

Lady Garden Foundation ‘Silent No More’ Garden by Darren Hawkes

The garden will be relocated to multiple sites in Jersey and in Cornwall. All locations have a connection to the people involved in the garden project and the charity. In Jersey, it will be spread across several public sites, including Gigoulande Mill pond and Trinity church yard. It's a lasting legacy that will be launched at Government House in November 2026.

All the plants within the garden have been chosen with these final sites in mind. Originating from the warmer regions of the mediterranean, some of the plants may appear less hardy but will thrive in coastal locations.

The Campaign to Protect Rural England Garden: ‘On the Edge’ by Sarah Eberle

Ethel Haythornwaite, one of Campaign to Protect Rural England's early campaigners, was instrumental in creating the Sheffield Green Belt. After the show, the garden will be relocated to Sheffield to continue that legacy – presenting the edgeland not as a static boundary, but as a dynamic and thriving place with nature at its heart.

The Eden Project: Bring Me Sunshine Garden by Harry Holding and Alex Michaelis

After the show, the garden will be permanently relocated to Eden Project Morecambe, where it will form part of a new 1.5-acre community garden. It will provide an engaging space for learning, gathering and community stewardship.

The Tate Britain Garden by Tom Stuart-Smith

The Tate Britain Garden at RHS Chelsea is due to be incorporated into a larger new Clore garden anticipated to open in autumn 2026 at Tate Britain, on London's Millbank.

Asthma + Lung UK Breathing Space Garden by Angus Thompson

The Asthma + Lung UK Breathing Space Garden is being relocated to Rotherham NHS Foundation Trust's Breathing Space – a lung rehabilitation centre supporting people with lung conditions from all over Yorkshire. The garden will become a permanent therapeutic space offering holistic support for people living with lung conditions, maintained in partnership with the local community.

***A Garden for Every Parkinson's Journey* by Arit Anderson**

After the show, the garden will be relocated to John Radcliffe Hospital, Oxford. John Radcliffe Hospital is a Parkinson's centre of Excellence in the UK; its relocation will allow more of the Parkinson's community to enjoy the space.

***The Children's Society Garden* by Patrick Clarke**

The garden is being relocated to a youth support centre in Leighton Buzzard, Bedfordshire. Leighton Buzzard offers services that give teenagers the time to talk, reflect and get the support they need without long waits or barriers.

***The Killik & Co Garden* by Baz Grainger**

The garden is being relocated to a Centrepoin shelter, Agar House, in Camden.

Small Show Gardens

***Addleshaw Goddard: Flourish in the City* by Joe and Laura Carey**

The garden will be relocated to Baston House School, a specialist educational provider in Bromley for autistic children and young people. The garden will serve as a safe, calming and enriching space that supports their educational experience.

***Journey Beyond the Tracks: From Adelaide to Perth* by Max Parker-Smith**

The plants used in *Journey Beyond the Tracks: From Adelaide to Perth Garden* will be relocated to Kensington Gardens. In addition, the hard landscaping is going to Longleat Zoo.

***The Boodles Garden* by Catherine MacDonald**

The pavilion, rill and selected plants will be relocated to a Historic Royal Palaces charity partner site. The garden's hard materials, tree, topiary, hedging and plants will be reused in the *RHS Royal Legacy Garden* at RHS Sandringham, before final relocation within the Sandringham Estate.

***Trussell's Together Garden* by Rob Hardy**

The garden is being relocated to the Strabane Foodbank, part of the Trussell community in Northern Ireland.

All About Plants

***Cleary Gottlieb: Time for Creativity* by Christina Cobb**

The garden is being relocated to the Centre of Literacy in Primary Education, in Waterloo. It will be expanded to create a valuable community resource.

***The Plant Heritage Missing Collector Garden* by The Planting Design Collective: Kate Campbell, Sally-Anne Rees and William Murray**

Plant Heritage: The Missing Collector Garden is being relocated to Chester Zoo in Autumn 2026.

The Bat Conservation Trust's Nocturnal Garden by Melanie Hick

After the show the space will be relocated to Clydach community garden in Swansea, a passionate local gardening group with a strong interest in planting for bats and dark sky standards.

Woodland Trust: Forgotten Forests Garden by Ashleigh Aylett

After the show, the garden will be relocated to Hawthorn Primary School in Newcastle upon Tyne. The school, which has achieved a Platinum Green Tree Schools Award, is situated in an area with low tree equity. The Green Tree Schools award programme connects pupils with nature, helping to inspire the next generation. At Hawthorn Primary School, the garden will strengthen the pupil's understanding of the natural world and increase access to trees in a neighbourhood where canopy cover is limited. This supports the principle of tree equity, which is the idea that all communities should have fair access to the many benefits trees provide.

YoungMinds Garden by Charlie Chase

A new community garden will be created in London's most socio-economically deprived area of Newham. After relocation, Chase Gardens will work with youth groups to transform the site into an ecologically productive space for the community and promote biodiversity for urban pollinators and wider wildlife to thrive.

Balcony Gardens

A Little Garden of Shared Knowledge sponsored by Viking by Katerina Kantalis

All plants will be redistributed to community groups.

Fettercairn: The Angels' Share by May Starey

The garden will be relocated to Fettercairn distillery in Cairngorms to become part of their distillery tour.

Alzheimer's Society: Microbes and Minds Garden by Tina Worboys

The garden will be relocated to Hallmark Luxury care home, for people living with dementia.

Hedgerow in the Sky – Tech Mahindra by Sarah Mayfield and Monika Greenhough

The garden will be relocated to a city centre nursery and afterschool club located in Brighton, East Sussex. Unsuitable specimens will be relocated to private gardens.

Tales from the Riverbank Garden sponsored by Kennedys' Independent Property Agents by Susie Kennedy and Kate Henning

The exhibit will be redistributed to various locations including other houseboat gardens, young new garden owners and future RHS show gardens.

The Transient Garden by Rebecca Lloyd Jones

The garden planters will be relocated in full as part of an event competition for their sponsor, Hamptons. Furniture will be donated to a local community garden.

Container Gardens

***The Seasalt Painted Garden* by Lynn James**

The garden will be relocated to The Leach Pottery, St Ives. The Leach Pottery was founded by one of The St Ives School artists and they are also making the paving for the garden.

***The Sightsavers Garden: we start with sight but we don't stop there* by Peter Karn, Janice Molyneux and Sarah Fisher**

The garden is being relocated to Chailey Heritage Foundation in Sussex after the show. The Chailey Heritage Foundation is a charity that runs a school for children and young people, aged 3 to 19, who live with complex physical disabilities, and associated health needs. The garden will be built within a redeveloped section of their therapy farm at the school, which will also be available to the public.

***The Whittard of Chelsea Garden* by Ollie Pike**

The garden will be relocated to an assisted living facility in Oxford. A facility ran by the mental health and wellbeing charity, Mind.

***Flood Re: Contain the Rain Garden*, by John Howlett**

The garden will be relocated to a primary school in Walthamstow. Located near wetlands, the garden will introduce planting and share water management ideas. In addition, the space will connect children with nature and inspire environmental awareness.
